Apply for funding through the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program 2

U.S. Maple producers are eligible for funding through the federal Coronavirus Food Assistance Program 2, which provides resources to alleviate losses as a result of the COVID pandemic. There's no requirement to demonstrate losses in order to apply. Many sugarmakers have reported that the process for applying is easy and that they have received funds. Details are here, or contact your local service center and someone there can help you apply. Applications are due by December 11.
